Thirteen year - old Gwen Camaya, a grade 8 student from *The Philippine School-Dubai*, was awarded and named as the Best Youngest Player during the *Emirates Group Rapid Chess Tournament* held at the Emirates headquarters overlooking Dubai airport terminal III last October 18, 2014.

The tournament had 50 participants who were of different nationalities who include the UAE nationals, Indians, Egyptians, British, Romanians, Latvians, Canadians, Chinese, Pakistanis, and Sri Lankans.

According to Mr. Armando Delgado, the Emirates chess club president, "Competition was fierce and the players had to show quick thinking and total concentration due to a 15-minute per player per game limit." Among the youngest participants, Gwen was the top finisher after 7 rounds of the play.

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To consistently ensure the safety and protection of the students in the school and in the community, The Philippine School collaborated with the Dubai Police and with the Philippine Consulate General in conducting a parents' forum on October 22, 2014 at the multi-purpose hall of TPS- Dubai. A similar medium specifically for the students was held the day after.

Mr. Thyab Bin Ali, the Chief of the Foreign Communities Awareness Program and a representative of the Dubai Police, espoused the significance of relationship and the communication between the parents and children that relatively affect the actions of the child. "Parents may give space for their children to grow but should monitor closely to understand their behavior," he said. He added that parents must become curious with the activities that their children are engaged to.

School board, parents stand pat on child-safety and protection

With the same purpose, the inspirational man of the hour, Consul General Frank Cimafranca said that communication must be strengthened at home to allow the children to freely express their fears and thoughts about certain things. "The primary responsibility of the parents is to care for their children and parents must not leave the sole responsibility of raising their children to the educational provider," he clarified. He accentuated that children's needs must be addressed by the parents, and that the parents must not solely rely on the school on the growth of their children. Cimafranca says that parents must take an active part in the growth of their offspring, and communication with the children will help in resolving problems common among students.

After the preliminary established programs, an open forum was conducted on which the parents of the students could ask questions regarding the safety of their children; before, during, and after class hours, and what the school and the Dubai Police could do to ensure their safety and protection. Among the questions asked were about bullying and how the school could prevent them, and the situations from escalating.

Dubai Police handles cases with minors as offenders with utmost consideration, and they are providing schools with information on how to teach children not to bully and not to be bullied.— Mr. Thyab Bin Ali

"The school has installed 16 CCTV's all over the campus, and in addition, suggestion boxes were placed in several areas of the school. This is useful for students who wish to express their fears with anonymity. The boxes are checked frequently and are investigated by the guidance counselor," Ms. Sollano said in reply to concerned parent.

"The prime responsibility in protecting the children must rest on the par-

ents. Teachers act as 'loco parents' in school but this is just temporary and situational. It is the sole duty of parents to look after their young. Parents must be sensitive to all the needs of their children, not only the material ones but also the emotional needs of the kids, "said H.E. Cimafranca.

The parents were also concerned about the students' transportation on questions like "Can the school provide a shuttle bus from the school to the station?" The parents' concerns were all noted and the school gladly accepted their suggestions to have additional busses, a pedestrian crossing to be placed in front of the school gate for students who are crossing the street, a shuttle bus for students who are taking the metro to ensure that they arrive the metro safely, and modern technology in the buses (I.D scanners and GPS). ... from front page

DUBAI, UAE - The Philippine School quadrangle was turned into a festival-themed market during the first culminating activity of the school year. The HELE/ TLE and ICT day was celebrated on the 30th of October 2014, with the theme, "Practical Education: Theory to practice." Students from all levels were able to showcase their skills in the competitions held that week. Green Hope UAE organised a student-led climate- change conference in Dubai and this was attended by over 120 youth delegates from the schools of Dubai, Sharjah, and Ajman on November 14, 2014. Deira International School, Dubai hosted the conference. The event was supported by Al Tamimi Engineering Services.

Entitled "Lima in Dubai, "this conference was a simulation of the negotiation processes adopted by nations which are a part of the global movement called *COP in My City* designed by French organization climates.

This question sparked the interest of Mark Umayam, and he responded, "I knew deep inside me, I ran for the position because I believe that I can do something different, and I can make a change not just for the school, but hopefully, to each and everyone's hearts. I want to inspire them to be someone who will try and make a change."

Are you the president who could be the president everyone is looking for? "I cannot say that

I can be the president that everybody's looking for, because the Supreme Student Council is not just about the president. I believe that together with the cooperation of the administration and the student body, we could make and bring the necessary improvements that we have long been waiting for."

Also, we asked him about the qualities that a president should have. "Being the leader, I believe that one of the most important qualities that he or she should have is that passion to lead."

Do you think you have these leadership qualities?

"I sincerely believe that I have this quality. Why? It is because one of the main reasons why I ran for presidency is for the students. I would like to bring the necessary changes in order to make this institution, in order to make The Philippine School a better place for learning and a better place to develop one's skills and talents."

Do you think the students believe in your potential?

"I think it would be best if we give the question to the students. After all, they were the ones who voted for us. They were the ones who installed us into our own positions but knowing that majority of the students voted for me and my co-SSC members, then, I must assume that we have their trust. I must assume that they believe in our potentials and in our capabilities to bring or make something different, to be specific."

He was also interrogated regarding the certain challenges he faced since he became the president. "It has not been months since we have been installed in our positions and I believe that major challenges will occur in the latter part, we are prepared anyway. I also believe that challenges also occur when an organization is not well organized or the officials running that certain group is not worthy of their positions, but, to be very honest, it is so far so good. I would like to thank the voters because as early as now, I can say that they have chosen the right people."

The officers were officially installed on October 2, 2014 during the flag ceremony at The Philippine School quadrangle.

The officers aim to create a better and a more conducive learning environment for the students while planning to establish activities where students would be able to grow not only academically, but also morally and socially. This is by exposing them to challenges and preparations from which they could benefit from.

Among the platforms they plan to institute are the re-establishment of the Leadership Training Program - This is for students who aspire to be leaders to be better leaders; Better facilities such as new chairs and water-dispensers along the corridors; Photography contests; Battle of the Bands; and Dance Contests to name a few. They also planned on continuing the previous activities and programs that have been previously done in the school such as the newly-instituted Halloween Party, Christmas Party, and Valentine's Day. The officers held a meeting soon after the installation to discuss the plans for the rest of the school year.



The KHDA 2013-2014 inspection, TPS' strong points

The Dubai School Inspection Bureau (DSIB) of the Knowledge and Human Development Authority (KHDA) carried-out a school inspection at the Philippine School on March 17-21, 2014. TPS had received an ACCEPTABLE mark from the extensive scrutiny and highlighted numerous strong points.

Some of the key strengths of TPS are as follows:

- -Students' good attainment and progress in Filipino in the elementary and secondary phases and in English at secondary phase;
- -Students' good personal responsibility across all phases, except in secondary which was outstanding;
- -Students' well developed cultural awareness, and creativity in expressing this respectfully through both Filipino and Emirati performing arts:
- -The good provision for health and safety across all phases;
- -The good support from parents for the school's preparation of students for the next stage of their education.

Progress since last inspection

The school was now compliant with the time requirements for teaching Arabic as an additional language;

The school had improved the validity of its assessment through the use of International Benchmark Tests; teacher had yet to make consistent use of an assessment to plan suitable next steps in learning for their students;

The school had improved its identification of students with special education needs, including gifted and talented, through its appointment of a Special Education Needs Coordinator;

Staff had improved the quality of their improvement planning to include specific objectives, realistic timescales, and necessary resources and training. Plans were now more realistic and manageable, and more closely focused on suitable priorities for improvement.

How good is the students' personal and social development?

Personal responsibility was good in Kindergarten and elementary, and outstanding in secondary school. This reflected the school's happy, respectful, and cohesive ethos. Students were self-disciplined. Seniors supported younger students conscientiously. They were responsible class officers and marshals, and participated well in weekly clubs. The School Council initiated and led fundraising for victims of conflict and natural disasters. Students ate healthy food and exercised during morning assemblies. Attendance was good overall.

Students recognized universal values of Islam and showed a good understanding of how these values influenced their lives in Dubai. They manifested strong respect for prayers and used Arabic greetings often. They compared the features of UAE and Philippines and appreciated living in Dubai. They showed strong pride and understanding of their own culture through organized learning activities. The social studies curriculum enhanced their awareness of other cultures.

Students' community and environmental responsibility was good. They actively supported others less fortunate. They worked hard together to perfect frequent sporting and artistic performances. They were aware of the value of education. Students of all ages conscientiously cared for their school, and supported environmental initiatives, through recycling and beach cleaning.

How good are teaching and assessment?

Teaching was good in secondary school and acceptable in Kindergarten and elementary. Teachers used ICT appropriately in most lessons, and positive teacher-student interactions featured in almost all lessons. Practical activities were a feature of the more successful teaching and learning.

Assessment was acceptable in all phases of the school. Teachers had expanded their range of assessment tools. Entry and exit tests and external bench marking for all students in elementary and secondary school were mandatory. Teachers effectively moderated internal tests and aligned their students' performance against curriculum standards. Teachers helped students assess their own learning and set new targets using a range of methods, such as 'learning stations'. Increasingly, teachers used external tests to identify areas of weakness and adapt the curriculum accordingly.

How well does the school provide for students with special educational needs?

The school leaders showed a strong commitment to the inclusion of students with special educational needs and gave their full support to the newly appointed coordinator and counselor. The school had improved its identification and assessment process, which were, on the whole, accurate and reliable.

The counselor provided effective support for students with behavioral, social and emotional needs which enabled them to make acceptable progress. Most teachers were aware of students' specific needs and modified their teaching methods in lessons. They often provided additional support at break times and extra worksheets to complete at home.

How well does the school protect its students?

Health and Safety was good on all phases. Staff supervision around the school was conscientious and senior students monitored their younger peers. Clinic staff monitored students' weight and school initiatives promoted healthy eating. The school's emphasis on physical education and dance contributed to students' health and wellbeing. Staffs at all levels were caring and were aware of child protection arrangements. School travel was well monitored.

The quality of support for students was acceptable across all phases. All members of the school community showed care and concern for the needs of the students. Almost all teachers managed behavior supportively. The school welcomed students with special education needs and there was a commitment to ensure that they took a full part in school life.

The school maintained adequate processes for checking academic and personal development of all students. The school was diligent in recording of attendance and punctuality and responded promptly, where necessary, to ensure high levels of attendance. The school provided useful guidance for students on subject options and career choices.

How good are the leadership and management of the school?

The senior leader's clear vision focused on 'values' education and preparing students well for the next steps in education. They had begun to compare their students' attainments to international standards. Middle leaders had clear roles, with increased non-teaching time to fulfill these.

The school evaluated its strengths and weaknesses in staff friendly way. Most understood what needed to improve. Resultant improvement plans clearly identified actions, person;s responsible, timescales and measures of success.

The partnership with parents and the community was good. Parents identified strongly with the school and valued its promotion of Filipino Cultural identity within the context of Dubai. They appreciated 'Orientation Evenings' which have informed them of curriculum change originating in the Philippines. Most also found school reports regular and helpful. These were clearly understood lines of communication between home and school using student diaries as well as letters and phone calls. Parents recognized the school's involvement of their children in celebrating important national events in the UAE, and supporting communities in need.

The recently formed governing council included a broad range of stakeholders as well as the Principal and the Managing Directress. Council members clearly understood their role of challenge and support for school improvement. They knew about aspects of school performance, for example, students' attainment.





Faculty members of the Philippine School undergo a seminar of K-12, initiated by the Center for the Professional Development of Academic Leaders and Supervisors on February 28, 2014 in Sharja, United Arab Emirates. The seminar workshop dwelt on the theme of "Unpacking the K-12 curriculum for effective teaching to the standards." While all of the initiatives are enthusiastically prepared, teachers open the door for the students; therefore, learners must be mindful to get themselves into it. The TPS management and the educational administration have been advancing to be the students' wagon to the star; however, students will need to cooperate with the school for a direction to

a spot-on life experience.

K -12 curriculum aims to render real learning experience for students, according to the Department of Education. With this, the TPS organization has concerted efforts for the school children to enjoy rights of being shown a lot of life. The program of K-12 will push through immersion which is defined as a complete involvement in an activity or interest. This may include earn-while-you-learn opportunities, and provision of relevant exposure and actual experience in students' chosen track, and course of field. K-12 is a student-centred learning that requires students to be pragmatically active, responsible participants in their own learning and with their own pace of learning. This is focused on the student's interests, abilities, and learning styles, placing the teacher mostly as a facilitator of learn-

Once you are equipped with clear understanding with this, you are ready to make theories and action plans materialize, and to take effect. The school is an institution for instruction and training. The school's function then helps you to focus your attention to industry experience and to productive life. 
Josephine's and Lawrence' views are both reasonable. Although relative, not every story happens similarly to everybody. Isn't it?




If only others could see

They say your best friend is your other half; But you remind me that I'm already whole.




